Our Partnership

WelchGas has partnered with Sally's Hope in *Delivering for a Cure* - a community campaign to raise awareness about breast cancer and its impact on our lives. The **Big Pink Propane Truck** you see around the Mt. Pleasant area is our way of getting the message out about breast cancer prevention and treatment. WelchGas will donate a portion of its proceeds from every gallon of propane sold to the Sally's Hope Program. Through this partnership, more women will receive mammograms and more cancer patients will receive financial assistance. It is the goal of both **Sally's Hope** and **WelchGas** to keep monies local to provide assistance and care to our local community.

The Mission

Sally's Hope mission is to provide mammograms to the underserved and uninsured women of Titus County and to provide limited financial assistance to all cancer patients (both male and female).

We Have Helped:

We have provided (4) cancer patients with limited financial assistance and more than (30) women with screening and diagnostic mammograms.

Mammogram Voucher Program

- Assist uninsured /underserved women by providing screening and diagnostic mammograms at the Breast and Diagnostic Health Center of Titus Regional Medical Center

Cancer Patient Fund

- Assist active cancer patients receiving care at the Patty and Bo Pilgrim Cancer Center by providing limited financial assistance.

Such as;

- Assist with prescription fill/refill
- Chemo-Pump or Special Pouch
- Assist with co-pay
- Radiation Creams
- No Insurance
- Prosthesis
- Wigs

Breast Cancer Screening Guidelines

- Yearly mammograms are recommended starting at age 40 and continuing for as long as a woman is in good health.
- Clinical Breast Exam (CBE) should be part of a periodic health exam, about every 3 years for women in their 20s and 30s and every year for women 40 and over.
- Women should know how their breasts normally feel and report any breast change promptly to their health care providers. Breast Self-Exam (BSE) is an option for women starting in their 20s.
- Women at high risk (greater than 20% lifetime risk) should get an MRI and a mammogram every year. Women at moderately increased risk (15% to 20% lifetime risk) should talk with their doctors about the benefits and limitations of adding MRI screening to their yearly mammogram. Yearly MRI screening is not recommended for women whose lifetime risk of breast cancer is less than 15%.
